

# CLOSED CIRCUIT TELEVISION BRITISH STANDARD 7958 EVALUATION

1<sup>st</sup> April 2024 to 31<sup>st</sup> March 2025

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#### 1.0 METHODOLOGY

In order to comply with the requirements of British Standard 7958 Closed Circuit Television (CCTV) Management and Operation – Code of Practice and the recommendations contained in the Information Commissioner's CCTV Code of Practice and Biometrics and Surveillance Camera Commissioner's 'Surveillance Camera Code of Practice', Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough Council commissioned Plass Solutions Ltd to conduct an evaluation of the Nuneaton and Bedworth CCTV system.

Whilst the Information Commissioner's CCTV Code of Practice and the Biometrics and Surveillance Camera Commissioner's 'Surveillance Camera Code of Practice' mention that a review should be undertaken that assesses the effectiveness of the system, British Standards are specific in the criteria required to be covered by such an evaluation. However, the afore-mentioned Codes of Practice agree that the results of the evaluation should be publicly available.

The topics required to be covered by the British Standard are as follows:

- a) a description of the scheme and the geographical area(s) of operation the schemes policy statement
- b) the purpose and scope of the scheme
- c) any changes to the operation or management of the CCTV scheme
- d) any changes that have been made to the policy
- e) any proposals to expand or reduce the operation of the scheme
- f) the aims and objectives for the next 12 months.

The British Standard also requires the following information to be included within the evaluation:

- a) the number of incidents recorded by the scheme
- b) the number of incidents reported to the police and where appropriate other bodies
- c) an assessment of the CCTV scheme's impact on crime levels and types of crime in the area covered by the scheme.

As Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough Council Control Room is accredited to the abovementioned British Standard, therefore the following evaluation will focus on the content of that Standard as outlined above.

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#### 2.0 INTRODUCTION

## 2.1 Description of the scheme

The Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough Council CCTV system consists of 259 cameras (189 Nuneaton and 70 Bedworth) that have been installed at strategically positioned locations in Nuneaton and Bedworth.

The system is monitored by trained and dedicated staff.

#### 2.2 Communication

There is a dedicated CCTV transmission link to a Police control room, which is capable of receiving and monitoring live images. Other communication links exist and these include Retailers.

## 2.3 System Operation

The system is monitored by dedicated staff that have achieved or are in the process of achieving the accredited training now required by the Private Security Industry Act 2001. The system is operated and managed in accordance with current legislation and detailed CCTV Code of Practice and Operational Procedural Manual.

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#### 3.0 POLICY STATEMENT AND SCHEME DESCRIPTION

#### 3.1 Closed Circuit Television

The scheme initially comprises of cameras located in specific external and internal locations with control, monitoring and recording facilities at a dedicated location. A problem orientated process was utilised to assess the appropriateness of CCTV in the area subject of this evaluation. The cameras have therefore been sited to capture images that are relevant to the purposes for which the scheme has been established. The purposes of the CCTV scheme are outlined later in this report.

#### 3.2 Ownership

The scheme is owned by Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough Council who is responsible for the management, administration and security of the system. The owner's manage the system and ensure the protection of individuals and the public by complying with the Code of Practice.

## 3.3 Policy Statement

To promote public confidence by developing a safe and secure environment for the benefit of those employed, visiting or using the area.

To inspire public confidence by ensuring that all public area Closed Circuit Television (CCTV) systems which are linked to the Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough Council CCTV Control Room are operated in a manner that will secure their consistent effectiveness and preserve the civil liberty of law-abiding citizens at all times.

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#### 4.0 THE PURPOSE AND SCOPE OF THE SCHEME

#### 4.1 Purposes of the scheme

The following are the objectives for which the Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough Council CCTV system was established:

The following objectives have been established for the Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough Council CCTV and associated systems:

- a) reducing the fear of crime
- b) deterring and preventing crime
- c) assisting in the maintenance of public order and reducing offences involving vandalism and nuisance
- d) providing high quality evidence which may assist in the detection of crime and the apprehension and prosecution of offenders
- e) protecting property
- f) providing assistance with civil claims
- g) providing assistance with issues relating to public safety and health
- h) providing assistance and reassurance to the public in emergency situations

#### 4.2 Scope of the scheme

The cameras have been sited to capture images that are relevant to the purpose for which the scheme has been established.

The scheme will be operated fairly, within the applicable law and only for the purposes for which it is established or which are subsequently agreed in accordance with the Code of Practice.

Operators are aware of the purpose(s) for which the scheme has been established and that the CCTV equipment is only used to achieve the identified purposes.

The scheme will be operated with due regard for the privacy of the individual.

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Before cameras are placed in residential areas the residents in that area will be consulted concerning the proposed system. The results of the consultation will be taken into account.

The public interest in the operation of the scheme will be recognised by ensuring the security and integrity of operational procedures.

The system will only be operated by trained and authorised personnel.

An evaluation of the scheme will be made annually and this will be available to the public at specified locations.

Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough Council and partners support the individual's right to privacy and will insist that all agencies involved in the provision and use of Public CCTV systems connected to the Council's CCTV control room accept this fundamental principle as being paramount.

The scheme aims to provide surveillance of the public areas in order to fulfill the purposes of the scheme. The area protected by CCTV is indicated by the presence of signs. The signs are placed so that the public are aware that they are entering a zone which is covered by surveillance equipment. The signs state the organisation responsible for the scheme, the purposes of the scheme and a contact telephone number. Data will not be held for longer than necessary and disposal of information will be regulated.

The scheme is registered with the Information Commissioner. The registration number is Z5359541. The scheme will be managed in accordance with the principles of the Data Protection Act 2018, Human Rights Act 1998 and all other relevant legislation including the Surveillance Camera Code of Practice.

Reviews of Data Protection and Legal requirements are taken annually.

#### 4.3 Personnel

All personnel involved with the monitoring of CCTV have or are in the process of being vetted in accordance with the Council's recruitment process and are screened and vetted to BS7858:2019 and to Police vetting NPPV (Non Police Personnel Vetting) Level 2 Abbreviated.

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### 4.4 Training

All employees engaged in the monitoring and operation of CCTV have received or are in the process of receiving training to the standards required by the Private Security Industry Act 2001. As a further requirement of the above Act all operators will be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

## 4.5 Operation of the scheme

The system is operated in accordance with a Code of Practice and Procedural Manual. The scheme is registered with the Information Commissioner, details of which can be obtained from the Information Commissioner's website. The scheme operates within the requirements of the Data Protection Act 2018, Human Rights Act 1998 and relevant legislation.

#### 4.6 Audit

As mentioned in the introduction to this report the scheme is required to be independently monitored this includes a review of the scheme's operation and working practices.

An audit has been undertaken on 1<sup>st</sup> May 2025 prior to this evaluation report which considered the following:

a) The level of attainment of objectives and procedures.

The level of attainment of objectives is covered in the main evaluation. The statistics relate to the 2024/25 period. Procedures are governed by the Code of Practice and Procedural Manual; these were reviewed and comply with relevant processes and legislation in particular the Data Protection Act 2018 and Human Rights Act 1998.

b) Random audits of the data log and the release of information

All administrative documentation, which incorporate the release of information and incident reports in connection with this scheme were examined and all appear to be completed in accordance with the Procedural Manual.

#### c) The review policy

The review policy is outlined within the Code of Practice. Procedures are reviewed on an ongoing basis in order to comply with procedures and legislation.

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## d) Standard of costs for the release or viewing of material

The Information Commissioner states that requests are free of charge to the Data Subject. However, Nuneaton & Bedworth Borough Council may charge reasonable fees when responding to manifestly unfounded or excessive requests. There has been one Subject Access Request during 2024/2025 but no release of footage.

## e) Legislation

At the time of the above audit all legislative requirements appear compliant.

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#### 5.0 CHANGES IN OPERATION, MANAGEMENT OR POLICY

As reflected in the Code of Practice, any major changes to the Code of Practice take place only after consultation with the relevant management group and upon agreement of the organisations with a participatory role in the operation of the system.

- 5.1 Major changes to the code are defined as changes which affect its fundamental principles and shall be deemed to include:
  - additions and omissions of cameras to the matters which have privacy implications
  - additions to permitted uses criteria e.g. purposes of the scheme
  - changes in the right of access to personal data, except statutory requirements
  - significant legal implications.
- 5.2 Minor changes to this Code of Practice are defined as operational and procedural matters which do not affect the fundamental principles and purposes; these include:
  - additions and omissions of contractors
  - additional clarifications, explanations and corrections to the existing code
  - additions to the code of practice in order to conform to the requirements of
  - any statutory Acts and changes in criminal legislation

A minor change may be agreed between the manager and the owner of the system.

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## 6.0 PROPOSALS FOR THE SCHEMES INCLUDING AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

The Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough Council CCTV Control Room utilises the latest technology in Closed Circuit Television. This is seen as being beneficial to all those who visit, reside and work in the area and in particular to those with special needs.

The aims and objectives remain the same and these are the prevention and detection of crime, to reduce the fear of crime and make the area safe environment.

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#### 7.0 STATISTICAL ANALYSIS AND EVALUATION

In order to achieve meaningful evaluation, the CCTV scheme must be assessed against specific performance indicators which are relevant to the objectives of the scheme. This can be achieved by utilising baskets of indicators which are divided into the categories of Contextual, Key and Support Indicators.

#### 7.1 Contextual Indicators

Contextual Indicators relate to the circumstances or background surrounding the particular initiative. In this case the purposes of the CCTV are mainly to prevent and detect crime. Indicators will include both British Crime Statistics and Police Recorded statistics for this type of crime.

## 7.2 Key Indicators

Key Indicators are closely related to the actual objectives of the particular initiative and attempt to measures its effect. This will include the total crime for the police area. Included in this category will also be the number of incidents reported by the Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough Council CCTV Control Room to police and other agencies.

#### 7.3 Support Indicators

Support Indicators are used to refute or verify the key indicators. The measurements will include the number of media seized by police which contain evidential value.

## 7.4 EVALUATION

#### 7.4.1 Contextual Indicators

Contextual Indicators relate to the circumstances or background surrounding the particular initiative. In this case the purposes of the CCTV are mainly to prevent and detect crime. Indicators will include both British Crime Statistics and Police Recorded statistics for this type of crime.

The responsibility for the publication of crime statistics transferred from the Home Office to Office of National Statistics (ONS) in April 2012, with the year starting on 1<sup>st</sup> July and finishing on 30<sup>th</sup> June. The following information has been taken from the ONS website.

The latest figures from the Crime Survey for England and Wales (CSEW) showed that crime against individuals and households has generally decreased over the last 10 years with some notable exceptions, such as sexual assault.

The latest Crime Survey for England and Wales (CSEW) estimated 9.5 million incidents of headline crime (which includes theft, robbery, criminal damage, fraud, computer misuse, and violence with or without injury) in the survey year ending (YE) September 2024. This was 12% higher than last year's survey (8.5 million incidents in YE September 2023), mainly because of a 19% rise in fraud (to around 3.9 million incidents). This was similar to levels of fraud estimated in YE March 2020.

Experiences of domestic abuse, sexual assault, stalking and harassment among people aged 16 years and over are presented separately in our statistics as prevalence estimates (the proportion of all people who were victims in the previous 12 months). Over the last decade, there has been a gradual decrease in domestic abuse, but an increase in sexual assault. Latest estimates from the CSEW for YE September 2024 showed no statistically significant change in these experiences compared with YE March 2023, except for stalking:

- 4.5% of people aged 16 years and over had experienced domestic abuse in the last year (approximately 2.2 million victims).
- 2.8% (around 1.4 million people) had experienced stalking, a 0.6 percentage point decrease from 3.4% (1.6 million victims).
- 2.2% (approximately 1.0 million people) had experienced sexual assault.
- 9.0% had experienced some form of harassment (around 4.4 million people; this estimate is not comparable with the previous year).

Although police recorded crime does not tend to be a good indicator of general trends in crime, it can give more insight into lower-volume, but higher-harm offences, reported to the police, including those that the survey does not cover or capture well. Data for YE September 2024 showed that:

- The number of homicides decreased by 4% (to 550 offences) compared with YE September 2023 (572 offences).
- Offences involving knives or sharp instruments increased by 4% (to 55,008 offences) compared with YE September 2023 (52,969 offences).

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- Offences involving firearms decreased by 17% (to 5,372 offences) compared with YE September 2023 (6,499 offences).
- Robbery increased by 4% (to 82,347 offences) in comparison with YE September 2023 (78,865 offences).
- Shoplifting offences rose by 23% (to 492,914 offences) compared with the previous year (402,220 offences) and is the highest figure since current police recording practices began for the year ending March 2003.

Since the mid-1990s, the CSEW has shown long-term decreases in violence with and without injury, theft offences and criminal damage. Fraud and computer misuse estimates are only available from year ending (YE) March 2017 onwards. While fraud levels have fluctuated over this time period, there has been a decrease in computer misuse.

The headline CSEW crime measure captures theft offences, robbery, criminal damage, fraud, computer misuse, and violence with or without injury. There were an estimated 9.5 million incidents of CSEW headline crime in YE September 2024, a 12% increase compared with YE September 2023 (8.5 million incidents), mainly because of a 19% rise in fraud (to around 3.9 million incidents).

Providing context from a longer time period, CSEW headline crime remains lower than in the YE March 2017 survey (11.2 million incidents), when fraud and computer misuse were first included.

Police recorded crime covers more offences than the CSEW. It includes crimes against all people (including those aged under 16 years and those not permanently resident in households), businesses and organisations, and society (such as drug and weapons possession), that come to the attention of the police. Trends in police recorded crime are affected by improvements to recording practices and variations in police activity. These effects are more pronounced for some crime types.

In YE September 2024, police recorded 6.7 million crimes, which is the same as in the previous year. This is up from 4 million in YE March 2014. However, while increases over the last decade may include some genuine changes in trends in crimes that are reported to, and recorded by, the police, it will also be because of changes in police activity and recording practices. It therefore should not be used to say that overall crime has increased.

The Police crime map uses data from local forces. The hotspots give only a loose idea of where crimes happened. Actual locations and details of crimes are kept anonymous.

#### 7.4.3 Nuneaton crime statistics

The following tables depict the number of notifiable offences recorded by the police for Nuneaton and Bedworth. The availability of crime statistics for Nuneaton and Bedworth is now accessible through the online Police mapping facility. It should be noted that due to Covid-19 the way the Police are recording the crime figures on their website had changed and it was not possible to explore the exact locations of the cameras. The figures recorded below are a cluster of the areas (Nuneaton Town Centre, Nuneaton Central, Bedworth East and Bedworth West).

Offence categories – Nuneaton

Offence categories - Bedworth

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In 2020/2021 there was a 7.9% increase in recorded crime, Violence was again the most prevalent type of incident. In 2021/2022 there was a 6.8% decrease in recorded crime, Violence was again the most prevalent type of incident. In 2022/2023 there was a 3.9% decrease in recorded crime, Violence was again the most prevalent type of incident. In 2023/2024 there was a 4.1% increase in recorded crime, Violence was again the most prevalent type of incident. During 2024/2025 there was a 13.9% increase in recorded crime, Violence was again the most prevalent type of incident.

## 7.4.4 Incident Reports by CCTV

During 2023/2024 operating staff completed 792 incident reports for the camera locations; this has decreased to 671 incidents in the 2024/2025 period.

The number of on camera arrests has increased by 71.4% over the previous period.

## 7.4.6 Viewing and Seizure of evidence

The viewing and subsequent copying/seizure of recorded images can act as an indicator to support or refute the effectiveness of the scheme in obtaining meaningful evidence. However, it is difficult, if not impossible to ascertain from police records whether the images viewed have been used as evidence to obtain a conviction at court, assisted in any other clearance process or been used for intelligence purposes. Whilst officers complete a log when they receive copy DVDs/USB/Hard drive, the audit trail is difficult to trace from this point and this is the case with most CCTV schemes.

In 2020/2021 there were 126 reviews by the police, a decrease of 27.2% over the previous period. In 2021/2022 there were 105 reviews by the police, a decrease of 16.7% over the previous period. In 2022/2023 there were 126 reviews by the police, an increase of 20% over the previous period. In 2023/2024 there were 126 reviews by the police, same as the previous period. During 2024/2025 there were 194 reviews by the police, an increase of 54% over the previous period. This is still an indication that the CCTV system is effective and having the desired impact although the number of reviews has reduced.

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#### 8.0 CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATIONS

#### 8.1 Retrieval of Statistics

Retrieval of crime and offence statistics has proved difficult due to reduced resources. The statistics have therefore been obtained from the Home Office and Police websites.

#### 8.2 The CCTV Scheme

Whilst it is inadvisable to rely solely on Police statistics to evaluate the effectiveness of CCTV as they are notoriously unreliable due to the complexity of the reporting procedures, it is all that is required to comply with accreditation with the British Standard. More indepth research would need to be undertaken for a reliable conclusion to be made.

**Nuneaton:** In 2020/21 there was a 23.6% decrease in recorded crime and violence was the most prevalent type of incident. In 2021/22 there was a 4.1% increase in recorded crime and violence was again the most prevalent type of incident. In 2022/23 there was a 17% increase in recorded crime and violence was again the most prevalent type of incident. In 2023/24 there was a 0.6% increase in recorded crime and violence was again the most prevalent type of incident. During 2024/25 there was a 3.5% increase in recorded crime and violence was again the most prevalent type of incident.

**Bedworth:** In 2020/21 there was a 7.9% increase in recorded crime and violence was again the most prevalent type of incident. In 2021/22 there was a 6.8% decrease in recorded crime and violence remains the most prevalent type of incident. In 2022/23 there was a 3.9% decrease in recorded crime and violence remains the most prevalent type of incident. In 2023/24 there was a 4.1% increase in recorded crime and violence remains the most prevalent type of incident. During 2024/25 there was a 13.9% increase in recorded crime and violence remains the most prevalent type of incident.

In 2020/2021 the number of occurrences were 792 which was a decrease of 6.6% on the previous period. The most prominent recorded incidents were for Anti-Social Behaviour. The number of on camera arrests had decreased by 53.6% over the previous period. In 2021/2022 the number of occurrences were 405 which was a decrease of 48.9% on the previous period. The most prominent recorded incidents were for Anti-Social Behaviour. The number of on camera arrests had decreased by 1.3% over the previous period. In 2022/2023 the number of occurrences were 492 which was an increase of 21.5% on the previous period. The most prominent recorded incidents were for Anti-Social Behaviour. The number of on camera arrests had decreased by 19.7% over the previous period. In 2023/2024 the number of occurrences were 792 which was an increase of 61.0% on the previous period. The most prominent recorded incidents were for Anti-Social Behaviour. The number of on camera arrests had increased by 26.2% over the previous period.

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During 2024/2025 the number of occurrences were 6c71 which was a decrease of 15.3% on the previous period. The most prominent recorded incidents were for Anti-Social Behaviour. The number of on camera arrests had increased to 71.4% over the previous period.

In 2020/2021, there were 126 reviews by the police, a decrease of 27.2% over the previous period. In 2021/2022, there were 105 reviews by the police, a decrease of 16.7% over the previous period. The Information Commissioner's CCTV Code of Practice requires makes the following requirements:

"You should review regularly whether the use of CCTV continues to be justified. You will have to renew your notification yearly, so this would be an appropriate time to consider the ongoing use of CCTV

...there should be a periodic review (at least annually) of the systems effectiveness to ensure that it is still doing what it was intended to do. If it does not achieve its purpose, it should be stopped or modified."

### **Information Commissioners Code of Practice**

The purposes and scope of the scheme are detailed in Section Four of this report and these include the prevention and detection of offences. Whilst it is not possible to make an assumption that the CCTV system is actually preventing offences it is a component part of the preventative package. To remove or modify the use of the CCTV system may also detract from a further identified purpose, this being to reduce the fear of crime. It is therefore recommended that at present the system is effective in achieving its purpose, however, there appears to be no current research available which indicates the perceptions of the public, residents and those working in the area covered by the cameras.

#### 8.3 Camera Uses

It is necessary to be able to justify the existence of each camera which forms part of the CCTV scheme and the only measurement, is when it has been used during an incident. It should be explained that when monitoring of an incident, it is normal practice to use a number of cameras and therefore the analysis will have no resemblance to the actual number of incidents. However, it will provide an indication of the usefulness of each camera to the overall system when dealing with incidents.

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During 2024/25 the cameras were used on 3240 occasions. It is necessary to extract the static cameras as they cannot be manipulated and are installed for a specific purpose. This equates to an average of 13 usages per camera for all the CCTV schemes.

Taking the above averages for each camera system and using a similar principle to that previously adopted with other Local Authorities, all cameras registering lower than 6 incidents, this being half the average for each location, will fall into the category of being 'at risk'. During 2024/25 there were 69 cameras which fell below the above criteria and need further investigation.

It should be stated that accuracy depends upon the CCTV operator activating the incident software immediately so that cameras are automatically ascribed to the incident. This occurs rarely as it is difficult to concentrate on completing the software fields and remain observant at the same time, so details of the cameras are usually entered retrospectively.

#### 8.4 Future Evaluations

It is recommended that the Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough Council CCTV scheme be evaluated on an annual basis. This will ensure continued compliance with the British Standard, which is assessed each year; it will also provide compliance with legislation and the Surveillance Camera Codes.
