

Locality Hierarchy Study

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INTRODUCTION

There is an identified need to develop a Locality Hierarchy associated with the Development Principles work which informs the Borough Plan. It has to be determined which localities within Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough should be considered as the main localities, the sustainable localities or the local needs localities. The fundamental purpose of defining a Locality Hierarchy is to help direct new development to the most sustainable locations and to areas with the capacity to accommodate further growth.

This accessibility study identifies where there a deficit in facility provision but will primarily be a tool for justifying a suitable Locality Hierarchy to be set out in the Borough Plan.

The key elements assessed to determine accessibility are those which are considered to be the key basic services and facilities required by a person living in a locality, for example, food, access to education, recreation, employment and transport. A locality without these key elements is more than likely to result in its residents having to travel by private car to be able to access them; however, some localities which do contain a many of these key elements can be considered more sustainable.

Aims of Study

- Identify which localities in Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough are the most sustainable;
- Recommend a Locality Hierarchy to be considered as part of the Local Development Framework, and more specifically within the Borough plan.

Objectives of Study

- Identify the localities in Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough;
- Provide context information on each locality;
- Identify the key elements in each locality;
- Measure accessibility to services and facilities;
- Score each locality against a list of pre-determined criteria;
- Compare and contrast the accessibility and sustainability of each of the localities with a view to highlighting potential areas for service and/or facility improvement, a potential Locality Hierarchy.

Scope of Study

The study assesses the following localities within Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough:

- Abbey & Wem Brook
- Arbury & Stockingford
- Bede & Poplar
- Bedworth North & West
- Camp Hill & Galley Common

- Weddington & St Nicolas
- Whitestone & Bulkington

The most appropriate Locality Hierarchy for Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough will be decided in this study after reviewing the context and following an assessment of the services and facilities of relevant localities. The Locality Hierarchy is a reflection of the size and range of provision available in a locality as well as the policies relevant to the future growth of that locality. The purpose of a Locality Hierarchy is to establish which localities can support growth, and it will be used as a framework against which future levels of development can be determined.

METHODOLOGY AND DATA COLLECTION

Localities to be considered

- Abbey & Wem Brook
- Arbury & Stockingford
- Bede & Poplar
- Bedworth North & West
- Camp Hill & Galley Common
- Weddington & St Nicolas
- Whitestone & Bulkington

Data Collection

The study collects two main datasets:

- Contextual and demographic information;
- Information on key services, facilities and accessibility to services/facilities.

Contextual Information

Contextual information has been collected using the following sources of information:

The information below lists the contextual information collected for the localities:

- Previous Local Plan/Strategic Planning Policy designation: *Used to give an understanding of previous designation.*
- Locality Area (ha): *Used to give an indication of the physical size of the locality*
- Population (latest estimate): *Used to give an indication of how many people live in each locality and therefore how many people the locality supports.*
- Location description: *Used to describe the area.*

Key Services, Facilities and Activities Accessibility Information

A list of key services and facilities has been produced in order to assess the level of service provision, and consequently enable an informed view of the accessibility to be established. Listed below are the criteria used to assess the accessibility of localities and it provides a brief explanation of why each criterion was selected.

Please note: Data obtained from the Points of Interest GIS overlay is supplied by the Ordnance Survey and classed as being code 5 in completeness (81% - 100% complete).

A traffic light scoring system has been developed in order to undertake a sustainability assessment of each locality based on the accessibility. The key below illustrates the levels of sustainability, and the table below illustrates how each criterion was scored in terms of assessing its sustainability based on accessibility.

Locality analysis was carried out in two ways:

- desk top surveys; and,
- physical surveys.

Where a locality did not contain a particular service/facility, a distance was measured to the nearest service/facility. This illustrates where there is a deficiency in a service/facility and the level of accessibility to the nearest available service/facility.

This does not provide distances for all of the facilities listed above; therefore the distance of a similar facility has been used.

SURVEY RESULTS AND ANALYSIS

Locality overview

As a means to improve and coordinate public services at a local level Nuneaton & Bedworth Borough Council with its partners Warwickshire County Council and Warwickshire Police work together across the Borough to hold regular meetings, known as community forums, . Local health services and the voluntary sector are also involved.

Community forums are open public meetings, held four times per year at seven different localities within the Borough on week day evenings. These localities are:

- Abbey & Wem Brook
- Arbury & Stockingford
- Bede & Poplar
- Bedworth North & West
- Camp Hill & Galley Common
- Weddington & St. Nicholas
- Whitestone & Bulkington

At the meetings you have the chance to discuss what's important to you in your community with local councillors, police, and organisations that provide public services.


Examples of matters that are raised include: anti-social behaviour; roads/highways; speeding; parking; street lighting; housing; schools; youth provision; waste/recycling, and; environmental health.




Assessment of Key Characteristics

This section looks at the key characteristics, similarities and differences of the localities.

Profile: Abbey & Wembrook

Population: Total population (mid-2009) 16,827. Source: Warwickshire Observatory Locality Profile (January 2011)



Location description: This locality chiefly comprises the town centre of Nuneaton and the residential estate of Hill Top. The Coventry Canal forms part of the western boundary of the locality and the River Anker runs through the town centre. This area is probably the nearest thing Warwickshire has to an Inner City environment, with the highest proportion of terraced housing, the highest percentage of households with no car or van and the fourth highest percentage of social rented housing. According to the Index of Multiple Deprivation, Abbey and Wem Brook is the most deprived locality in Warwickshire and some of its constituent parts are among the top 10% most deprived nationally. According to the MOSAIC profile the most over-represented groups are the most deprived.

The locality incorporates the main shopping area of Nuneaton, consisting of two shopping centres, Abbeygate and Rope Walk and a twice weekly open air market. Other businesses and employment opportunities can be found in the Bermuda Park Industrial Estate in the area to the west of the railway line in the southern half of the locality and the nearby Business Park and Retail Park.

Employment opportunities in Leicester, Hinckley and Coventry are made accessible by a good bus service from the town centre.

Public services in the main town of Nuneaton include a Library and Information Centre, a one-stop shop situated in the Town Hall, Police and Fire Stations and the Warwickshire Justice Centre. Riversley Park is a pleasant Victorian park, which also provides an attractive location for a museum and art gallery, the registry office and a Sure Start children's centre. For transport services there are the bus and train stations providing links to the rest of the County and beyond. Recreational and leisure facilities within the locality include the Newtown Centre and the Pingles Leisure Centre. Community Centres include Hatters Space, Edward Street Day Centre and Wembrook Community Centre. There are also a number of churches and community centres in the area linked to faith based organisations.

Voluntary groups represented in the locality include the Nuneaton & Bedworth office of both Warwickshire Community and Voluntary Action and the Citizen's Advice Bureau. There are also Residents Associations and Neighbourhood Watch groups. The Nuneaton Club for Young People is a venue that offers social and sporting activities throughout the week.

Abbey & Wem Brook has a slightly younger age profile than the County average but it also has the highest rates of poor health and disability in the County. The proportion of the locality's working age population who are claiming benefits is over double the County average. The percentage of pensioners in receipt of pension credits is double the County average and the percentage of people in fuel poverty is the second highest out of all 30 localities.


According to the latest data (2008), one in four children are considered to be living in 'poverty' in the locality and the percentage of pupils eligible for free school meals is more than double the County average. The locality has the least well qualified adult population: 41.7% of the population have no qualifications compared to the County average of 27.8%. This lack of skills is likely to continue, since the percentage of pupils achieving five or more GCSEs at grades A*-C (including English and Maths) is 16 points below the County average and the rate of unauthorised absence from school is twice the County average. The percentage of Year 11s Not in Education, Employment or Training is double the County average, the highest of all 30 localities. Abbey & Wem Brook's crime rate of 173 per 1,000 population is more than two and a half times the County rate.

Rates of the individual categories of crime range between two and three times the County averages. Anti-social behaviour incidents are more than twice the County average. Unsurprisingly, the satisfaction of the residents with the area as a place to live is lower than the County rate and their main issue requiring improvement are activities for teenagers. This locality is one of only two to nominate clean streets in their top three issues requiring improvement, which may be a reflection of the level of ASB incidents and/or the town centre location.

Profile: Arbury & Stockingford

Population: Total population (mid-2009) 20,784. Source: Warwickshire Observatory Locality Profile (January 2011)



Location description: This locality combines the large housing estates of Stockingford and Bar Pool with the stately home and extensive landscaped gardens and woods of Arbury Hall and the industrial and retail parks and former mining village of Bermuda. Ensor's Pool lies in the east, between the communities of Bermuda and Heath End. Nuneaton's main NHS hospital (the George Eliot) lies in the northeast corner of the locality. The author George Eliot was born on one of the Arbury estate farms.

Within the locality there are a wide range of business and employment opportunities. Pool Road industrial estate includes an Opportunities Centre, which offers vocational courses to local people to improve their employment prospects. Bermuda Park includes industrial units, a business park and a retail park. Two innovation centres, Eliot Park and Bermuda, offer small and expanding businesses training support, office space and industrial units. EPIC is one of the UK's most environmentally friendly buildings.

Public services in the locality include a library and one-stop shop situated within Stockingford Early Years Centre. Leisure and recreational facilities include community centres at Grove Farm and Stockingford, the Jubilee sports centre and several play areas/recreation grounds. Whittleford Park, once the home of both coal mining and brick and tile making, has been reclaimed by nature and the local community. Seeswood Pool provides a resource for the Alvis Angling Club and the Nuneaton & District Birdwatchers Club. The Centenary Way passes through this locality.

There are Residents Associations and Neighbourhood Watch groups in the locality. The Friends of Whittleford Park group are involved in improving the open green spaces of the park. In 2008 Stockingford Residents Association received £3,000 from the County Council's Nuneaton & Bedworth Area Committee to create a family festival.

Arbury & Stockingford locality has one of the youngest age profiles in the County. The percentage of the population which is non-white is much lower than the County average and just over a quarter of that in neighbouring Abbey & Wem Brook. The characteristics of this locality are dominated by those of the two large housing estates, with high proportions living in terraced houses, in social rented housing or in households with no car or van. The percentage of the working population in managerial and professional occupations, at 15%, is the lowest in the County, while one in three of those in employment are in unskilled manual occupations. The percentage in skilled trades is, however, the highest in the County.

Furthermore, the percentages claiming Job Seeker's Allowance or other working age benefits are both considerably higher than County rate. There is also a high proportion of older residents claiming pension credits and children who are eligible for free school meals as well as families claiming Child Tax Credit, 91.8% compared with an equivalent County figure of 74.2%. According to the latest data (2008), one in five children in the locality are considered to be living in 'poverty,' along with three other localities in the Borough. The IMD shows two areas which are among the 10% most deprived SOAs in England.


Eleven of the fourteen SOAs in this locality are among the 30% most deprived nationally in terms of education, skills and training, with only 33.8% of pupils achieving five or more grades A*-C at GCSE (including English and Maths), compared to Warwickshire's percentage of 56.9%, the lowest of all 30 localities. The percentage of adults educated to degree level or higher is less than half the County average, while 38.8% have no qualifications, which is ten points higher than the County average.

Nine of the fourteen SOAs in this locality are among the 30% most deprived nationally in terms of crime and disorder. The overall rate of crime is above the County rate with the rate of domestic burglaries being the highest in the County. Consultation shows that residents in Arbury & Stockingford felt that levels of crime in their area were the top issue that needed improving in their area. Along with South Leamington, these were the only two localities to rate this as their top priority. Overall, residents of Arbury & Stockingford are significantly less satisfied than Warwickshire residents generally, with their area as a place to live, 64.5% compared with a County figure of 82.9%.

Location description: Originally a small market town of Saxon origin, Bedworth developed into an industrial town in the 18th and 19th centuries, due largely to coal mining and the overspill of ribbon weaving and textile industries from nearby Coventry. The opening of the Coventry Canal in 1769 and later, the railway in 1850 aided the town's growth. Well into the 20th century Bedworth was primarily a coal mining town, with three pits around the Exhall area. There has since been much regeneration work and the town is proud of its parks and green spaces having won several Britain in Bloom competitions. In recent years its good transport links have increased its role as a dormitory town for the nearby cities of Coventry, Birmingham and Leicester.

The main landmarks in the area are the Nicholas Chamberlaine Almshouses, rebuilt in Tudor style in 1840, the Parsonage Heritage Centre, the Bedworth Water Tower and the Miners Welfare Park, with its Miner in the Park sculpture. Business and employment opportunities within the locality are provided by the retail centre, the three-times-a-week covered market and the Bayton Road industrial estate. The insurer Domestic & General has offices in the town centre and is an important employer.

The railway station and M6 junction provide travel links to the north and south of the country and there are a number of local bus services. Public services include a library and information centre, a one-stop shop, access point and police and fire stations. Leisure and sports facilities include the Civic Hall and arts centre, a youth centre, leisure centre and a golf course. There are also sports and play areas at the Miners Welfare Park, including a skate park built in 2001 after campaigning by local youngsters. The Centenary Way walking trail passes through the locality. Voluntary and community groups include

Residents Associations and Neighbourhood Watch groups, a Lions Club, Bedworth Carers Group and a branch of the Citizens Advice Bureau. The Bedworth Society is a local civic amenity society, registered with The Civic Trust which was founded in 1981 to petition for the preservation of the Parsonage and now promotes awareness and conservation of Bedworth's built and natural environment.

Bede & Poplar's age profile is similar to the County average, with three in five being of working age (16-64 males, 16-60 females). The locality has a similar ethnic make up to the County, with 8.7% of people classed as non-white British at the time of the 2001 Census. The proportion of people claiming Job Seeker's Allowance is the third highest in the County and among those in employment, the percentage in managerial or professional occupations is lower than the County equivalent and the percentage in unskilled manual occupations is higher than the Country rate.

The proportion of the working age population claiming benefits is the second highest of all the localities, 20.4% compared to the Warwickshire rate of 11.3%. This is largely due to a higher proportion of people claiming Incapacity Benefit in the locality - the second highest in the County. Other indicators of poor health in this locality are the second highest rates of limiting long term illness and self reported poor health in the County.

There is a lack of skills in the locality, with the percentage having no qualifications the second highest in the County and the percentage of people qualified to degree level is less than half the County average. Furthermore, there is poor educational attainment among the current generation of pupils with the percentage achieving five or more grades A*-C at GCSE in 2010 (including English and Maths) sixteen percentage points below Warwickshire's rate. The proportion of 16-18 year olds Not in Education, Employment or Training is also higher than the County average. Two of the locality's SOAs are among the 10% most deprived in England on the Education, skills and training domain of the IMD.


The IMD shows aspects of deprivation in most of the SOAs in this locality, with only Bede South West scoring moderately well on all domains. The total crime rate and the rate of individual categories of crime are well above the County averages and three Super Output Areas are within the top 10% most deprived areas nationally on the IMD crime and disorder domain.

At the time of the 2001 Census, there was a high percentage of terraced housing in Bede & Poplar and the proportion of households in social rented housing is the third highest in the County along with the proportion of those without access to a car or van. Three of the most over-represented MOSAIC groups in this locality are 'residents with sufficient incomes in right-to-buy social houses', 'young people renting flats in high density social housing' and 'owner occupiers in older-style housing in ex-industrial areas.' Consultation activity shows that the residents of this locality have a lower rate of satisfaction with their area as a place to live compared to the County, 73.4% compared to a County rate of 82.9%. Bede & Poplar has a particularly low proportion of its residents who volunteer at least once a month, the second lowest of the 30 localities at 17.3%. Activities for teenagers are the top priority for improvement in the area.

Profile: Bedworth North & West

Population: Total population (mid-2009) 18,861. Source: Warwickshire Observatory Locality Profile (January 2011)



Location description: Bedworth North & West locality is made up of several, somewhat separate communities, divided from the main area of Bedworth by the A444 trunk road and the M6 motorway, plus the areas of Collycroft and Mount Pleasant to the northwest of Bedworth town centre. Just south of the Keresley Newlands estate, on the site of the old Coventry and Keresley coal mines, is the Prologis Park which is part of a regeneration initiative for the area. At its gate is half of a winding wheel from one of the pitheads, in memory of the role of mining across the whole of the area. Coventry pit closed in the mid 1990s and the site has been landscaped with parkland, ponds, lakes, footpaths and cycle ways linking employment areas. Part of Prologis Park lies within the locality, providing employment opportunities for the community.

Public services within the locality comprise two libraries and seven schools, and there are bus services to facilities in Bedworth and Coventry. Venues for community activities are Keresley Village Community Centre, which has an IT suite that provides computer courses for all ages and Bedworth Heath Activity and Leisure centre, which hosts events and shows, adult education classes and clubs and societies. It has an I.T. centre, children's centre, community shop and Bridgeway Day service in a building designed for disabled access.

There are also Residents Associations and Neighbourhood Watch groups in the locality.

The age profile of this locality is generally similar to that of the County as a whole. The percentage of the population which is non-white is slightly lower than the County average. The percentage of the working age population claiming benefits, including Jobseeker's Allowance, is slightly higher than the County average and those in employment are less likely to be in managerial or professional occupations and more likely to be in unskilled manual occupations than the County average.

There is a lack of skills in the locality, with the percentage having no qualifications eight points higher than the County average and the percentage qualified to degree level or above just half of the County average, the highest proportion outside of Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough. However, the educational attainment among the current generation of pupils is similar to the County rate in 2010 with 54.7% of pupils achieving five or more grades A*-C at GCSE (including English and Maths) compared to a Warwickshire rate of 56.9%. The percentage of Year 11s Not in Education, Employment or Training is below the County average.

The IMD shows some pockets of poorer health in the locality which explain the above-average levels of limiting long term illness (19.3% compared to the County rate of 16.8%), self-reported ill health (9.7% not in good health compared to the County's 8.1%) and disability allowance claimants (6.3% compared to Warwickshire's rate of 4.3%) in the locality.

The total crime rate within the locality is slightly lower than in the County as a whole, with the different categories of crime at similar levels to Warwickshire's rates, except for domestic burglary which is higher. However, the IMD shows that two Super Output Areas, Keresley North & Newlands and Heath Sports, are actually within the top 10% most deprived areas nationally on the crime and disorder domain. Unlike neighbouring Bede & Poplar locality, Bedworth North & West has lower than average percentages of terraced housing and people in social rented housing. The dominant (and over-represented) MOSAIC groups in this locality are 'residents with sufficient incomes in right-to-buy social houses' and 'owner occupiers in older-style housing in ex-industrial areas.' Consultations show that the residents of this locality are less satisfied with it as a place to live than the Warwickshire residents, generally, with activities for children being the top priority for improvement. Bedworth North & West's residents have a lower rate of volunteering compared to the equivalent County rate, 18.2% of residents volunteer at least once a month compared to a County rate of 26%.

Profile: Camp Hill & Galley Common

Population: Total population (mid-2009) 15,245. Source: Warwickshire Observatory Locality Profile (January 2011)



Location description: This locality encompasses the distinct residential areas of Whittleford, Chapel End, Galley Common and the large former local authority housing estate of Camp Hill. There are a number of landmarks within the locality including part of the Coventry Canal, the Whittleford Park wildlife area, the Dingle green open space and the Judkins quarry site. The former Midland quarry site in the eastern part of the locality is now undergoing significant redevelopment to provide housing, industrial units and leisure facilities. The site includes the largest retaining wall in Europe (35m high), which was constructed to enable redevelopment of the quarry to go-ahead.

Levels of deprivation within the locality are amongst the highest in the County and are concentrated in the Camp Hill area. According to the Index of Multiple Deprivation, four of the five Super-Output Areas (SOAs) in Camp Hill ward are ranked within the top 30% most deprived SOAs in England. Its most deprived SOA, the Village Centre, is ranked within the top 5% nationally and is the second most deprived SOA in Warwickshire. This area fares particularly poorly in terms of deprivation linked to Education, Skills & Training where it is ranked as the 125th most deprived SOA (out of the 32,482 SOAs in England), placing it within the top 0.5% of all SOAs. The SOAs in Galley Common are relatively less deprived with one SOA featuring in the 20% least deprived SOAs nationally.

A major regeneration partnership project entitled 'Pride in Camp Hill' is currently well underway to address the problems of deprivation in Camp Hill. Its aim is to transform Camp Hill, through a series of physical and socio-economic regeneration initiatives, along with service delivery improvements. This includes building new, modern houses and upgrading existing ones, whilst providing additional leisure, commercial, retail and industrial development to improve the local infrastructure. The project has also introduced measures to reduce crime, boost educational standards, improve health levels and provide better training, skills and career opportunities for residents. Although the Opportunities Centre on the Pool Road Industrial

Estate is located within the neighbouring locality of Arbury & Stockingford, it provides a wide range of free vocational courses for local residents to improve their employment prospects. Over 750 people have benefited from training since it opened, some of whom have actually been offered employment with the local Camp Hill developers and construction companies.

The Camp Hill Enterprise and Employment ResourceS (CHEERS) team in Cedar Road has also helped local residents search for jobs and has provided support for new and existing businesses. There are a range of public services within the locality including a library, youth centre and family community centre situated in the Camp Hill Education, Sports and Social Centre. There is also a recycling centre and the County Links bus service which connects the area with Nuneaton Town Centre. Community and voluntary groups within the locality include the Friends of Whittleford Park who are involved in improving its open green spaces and facilities. A number of Residents' Associations and Neighbourhood Watch Groups are also active and play a key role in highlighting local issues and making the area safer. The main regular community event in the area is the annual Camp Hill family festival.

In terms of population, Camp Hill and Galley Common locality has the highest proportion of children and the third lowest proportion of older people in the County, which contributes to the area having the highest average household size in Warwickshire. At the time of the 2001 Census, there was a low proportion of non-white British residents, 3% compared with 7.2% of the population for Warwickshire, which is the lowest proportion of all the localities in Nuneaton & Bedworth Borough. Camp Hill and Galley Common locality also has a relatively high proportion of its working age population claiming benefits and the area has the third highest lone parent benefit claimant rate, at more than double the County rate.

The Mosaic dataset shows that when compared to the County profile, Camp Hill and Galley Common is heavily over represented by 'families in low-rise social housing with high levels of benefit need' and 'young people renting flats in high density social housing.' Conversely, the locality has an under-representation of the more affluent Mosaic groups and those featuring older people. According to the 2001 Census, the largest proportion of working age people within the locality are employed in elementary occupations (16.5%) and the smallest proportion (6.5%) employed in professional occupations, almost half the County figure of 12%. However, the proportion of people working as skilled tradespersons is well above the Warwickshire figure.

In terms of qualification levels, less than 10% of the locality's working age population have the equivalent of a university degree compared with just over 20% across Warwickshire. The locality also has more than double the County proportion of 16-18 year olds not in formal education, employment or training with one in ten classed as NEET. The proportion of pupils achieving 5 or more GCSE grades A*-C (including English & Maths) in the locality is sixteen percentage points lower than the equivalent figure for Warwickshire.


Whilst Camp Hill and Galley Common's crime rate is above the County's rate, the locality has the 2nd highest rate of domestic burglaries per 1,000 of the population with 15.2 burglary offences compared with a County figure of 8. Consultation results showed that residents have a fairly low perception of their

neighbourhood and that activities for teenagers, level of crime and facilities for young children were viewed as the issues most in need of improvement in the locality. Interestingly, facilities for young children was ranked as the third most important issue in need of improvement in the area – making this the only locality to highlight this as a key concern. Camp Hill and Galley Common has the lowest percentage of people out of all 30 localities who volunteer at least once a month, 16.7% of residents compared to a Warwickshire average of 26%.

Profile: Weddington & St Nicolas

Population: Total population (mid-2009) 16,102. Source: Warwickshire Observatory Locality Profile (January 2011)



Location description: Although it borders on Nuneaton town centre, the character of this locality is semi-rural suburbia. It is made up of three large housing estates: Weddington, Horeston Grange and St Nicolas Park, a section of the Whitestone estate and a number of outlying farms. There are also two industrial estates that offer business and employment opportunities, around the railway lines in the Southwest of the area. Local shops are located in both the Horeston Grange and St Nicolas Park estates.

The countryside that lies to the north and east of the housing estates is designated as an area of restraint, as far as development is concerned. The River Anker is prone to flooding and an area in the northwest of the locality is a designated flood risk area and an area in the south is deemed to benefit from Nuneaton's flood defences.

Recreational and leisure facilities within the locality include Etone Sports Centre, the Weddington Sport & Social Club and football, rugby, cricket and bowls clubs. There are also many play areas and sports fields across the locality, including the green belt land at Sandon Fields. Voluntary groups in the area include the Higham Lane Residents Association and the Nuneaton North East Neighbourhood Watch group. There is a Second Chance furniture charity which aim is to provide affordable furniture and white goods for those in receipt of benefits. There are bus routes serving each of the three estates,

providing access to the facilities in Nuneaton town centre and the main line railway station lies on the border of this locality.

The age profile of this locality is similar to the County average. On the other hand, the percentage of the population which is non-white is below average and less than a third of the percentage in neighbouring Abbey & Wem Brook. Weddington & St Nicolas locality is generally an affluent area, with nine of its thirteen SOAs among the 20% least deprived in England.

The area has the lowest percentage of social rented housing of all 30 localities, at 5.3% compared to Warwickshire's figure of 14.3%. The Mosaic dataset shows that the area has an over-representation of the groups 'middle income families living in moderate suburban semis' and 'successful professionals living in suburban or semi-rural homes'. Amid this affluence, the minorities in deprived areas of social housing, those living in isolated farms and older people with high care needs must not be overlooked.


At the time of the 2001 Census, 45% of those in work were in managerial or professional occupations. There are lower than average percentages claiming Job Seekers Allowance (JSA) or other working age benefits. The skill levels of adults in this locality are slightly above the County average and the educational attainment of the current generation is one of the highest in the County: seven in ten pupils achieved five or more A*-C grades at GCSE. The percentage of Year 11s Not in Education, Employment or Training is the one of the lowest in the County as well as the proportion of children considered to be in 'poverty' which is the lowest of all 30 localities, 4% compared to a County rate of 11.9%.

The overall crime rate in the locality is well below the Warwickshire rate and the area has below average rates for all crime types in 2009/10. The level of satisfaction with the area as a place to live among residents of Weddington & St Nicolas is higher than the County average, 91.1% compared to Warwickshire's 82.9%. Residents in this area perceive activities for teenagers to be the issue most in need of improvement along with levels of traffic congestion and road and pavement repairs.

Profile: Whitestone & Bulkington

Population: Total population (mid-2009) 16,745. Source: Warwickshire Observatory Locality Profile (January 2011)



Location description: This locality is made up of two distinct settlements: Bulkington village and Whitestone separated by open fields and the Canal. Bulkington is a large village to the east of Bedworth, which is old enough to have been recorded in the Domesday Book (as Bochintone – meaning 'town of the beech trees'). In the past weaving was the village's main industry - brought to the area by French Huguenots in the 17th century. Today Bulkington is mainly a commuter village for the larger nearby towns. The village has connections with Arbury born author George Eliot who referred to it as Raveloe in her book *Silas Marner* (1861) and whose uncle and aunt are buried in the village church of St James.

Community facilities include a library and a village hall and there are two primary schools. The centre of Bulkington has been designated a Conservation Area, so that development of any kind is restricted. Whitestone is perceived to be one of the more desirable residential suburbs of Nuneaton. Until the 20th century the area was largely undeveloped with just a few farms and large houses, although there was some quarrying in the area. Extensive house building began after the second world war and continued to the end of the century. Community facilities include three shopping areas, a community

centre, a clinic and the Paul's Land Pavilion at one entrance to the area's largest recreation ground, Paul's Land, which incorporates a number of playing fields and a large play area. Whitestone boasts a number of other play areas, including Crowhill Park and there are two primary schools.

Given the proximity of Nuneaton & Bedworth, most sports and social clubs are based outside this locality, although, for example, the Bedworth and Exhall Camera Club hold its meetings at the Bulkington Village Centre. Nuneaton Golf Course lies in the northeast corner of this locality. Voluntary groups in the area include a Residents Association, Neighbourhood Watch group and Volunteer Centre.

Whitestone & Bulkington locality has an older population profile than the County average. Over one in four adults is of retirement age, which is the third highest in the County and the proportion of children aged 0-15 years in the locality is the third lowest of all 30 localities, at 16.3% compared to a County rate of 18.3%. Ethnic diversity is low, with the percentage of the population which is non-white lower than the County average and more than ten percentage points lower than in the neighbouring Abbey & Wem Brook locality.

For those in work in this locality, the profile of occupations is similar to the County average, although the percentage in Elementary occupations is relatively low. The MOSAIC classification shows 'active elderly people living in pleasant retirement locations,' 'residents of small and mid-sized towns with strong local roots' and 'elderly people reliant on state support' to be over-represented in this locality. The older age profile reflected in these groups is likely to be a factor in the higher than average proportions of people with a Limiting Long-Term Illness / Not in Good Health / claiming Disability Living Allowance.

The percentage of adults in the locality with no qualifications is slightly above the County average and the percentage with higher qualifications is slightly below average, which is likely to be linked to the older age profile. The percentage of current pupils achieving five or more grades A*-C at GCSE (including English and Maths) is similar to the County average and the proportion of Year 11s Not in Education, Employment or Training is slightly above the equivalent Warwickshire proportion. The Youth Services membership in this locality is the second lowest in the County, at 6.3% compared to a County average of 11.5%.

The locality's overall recorded crime rate is well below the County rate, this is true for all crime types except domestic burglary which is slightly higher than the Warwickshire rate. The low crime rate is not wholly recognised by the residents, as Levels of Crime is rated as an issue in need of improvement in the locality. Generally, this locality is not deprived according to the Indices of Multiple Deprivation, but Attleborough North West SOA, which straddles this and Abbey & Wem Brook locality, is ranked within the top 30% most deprived areas in England overall, and in the top 20% most deprived areas on the indices of health & disability and crime & disorder. The other Attleborough

SOAs also show some level of deprivation, most notably Attleborough Southwest's deprivation in terms of barriers to housing and services. Overall, the satisfaction of residents with the area as a place to live is above the County as a whole, at a rate of 85.5% compared to a County average of 82.9%.

Sustainable Localities

The sustainability of a locality is in part determined by the level of access to services/facilities. An important component of this is ensuring that the services remain viable and can be retained.

The sustainability of a locality together with the availability of suitable sites, will impact on the ability of the locality to accommodate further growth. However it should be noted that where a locality is deemed sustainable this does not mean it will necessarily be recommended to accommodate significant growth.

In order to assess sustainability of the locality a number of factors were considered, these include:

- Transportation and accessibility;
- Convenience services;
- Community Services;
- Health care;
- Education provision;
- Access to employment and services.

The following section considers each of these factors as they relate to all of the localities. There are tables which score both of the localities according to the traffic light scoring matrix set out above. The 'yes' and 'no' columns in the tables indicate whether or not the service is available in the localities. Appendix A provides the overall locality scores.

Transportation and Accessibility

Transport links to Nuneaton and Bedworth Town Centres and other centres such as Coventry or Leicester are vital to the sustainability of localities. Public transport links are particularly important, in terms of frequency and actual provision. Where there are high frequency service levels there is more of an opportunity for residents to access higher tier localities without the use of a car. Therefore the actual distance of a service or facility to a locality is not necessarily the most important factor because they may not be accessible via public transport. This assessment considers whether services/facilities can be accessed via walking or cycling.

The table below presents the scores for the localities in relation to transport services.

All localities achieve the maximum score since all transport services / facilities are provided within settlement. The level of service has three groupings:

- Abbey & Wembrook and Arbury & Stockingford
- Bedworth North & West and Camp Hill & Galley Common
- Bede & Poplar; Weddington & St Nicholas ; lastly Whitestone & Bulkington

Localities which contain parts of central Nuneaton have the greatest level of service provision as the town is the major transport hub having greater number of bus stops and frequency of service. The provision of defined cycle routes is also better.

Bedworth North & West and Camp Hill with Galley Common are evenly matched in terms of scores and service levels, there is very little between these two localities.

For Weddington & St. Nicholas the amount and frequency of bus services is nearly half that of the best connected locality Arbury and Stockingford.

Although Whitestone village has greater bus services, it is the lack of service in Bulkington which determines the locality average, just a quarter of the level provided in Arbury and Stockingford.

Convenience Services

Convenience services are those services that are considered to be essential or needed on a frequent basis. For the purposes of this assessment, the list of convenience services include:

- Paper round;
- Grocery round/delivery.

In all 18 services are assessed, the maximum possible score is 36, the variation of scores is quite narrow between 36 and 30 reflects the general high level of convenience service provided within each locality.

Three localities attain the maximum score of 36:

- Abbey and Wembrook
- Weddington & St Nicholas
- Whitestone & Bulkington

The level of service provision shows a larger variation from 271 in Abbey & Wembrook, which includes the core of Nuneaton town centre to just 63 in Camp Hill & Galley Common

The best served locality is Abbey & Wembrook with a maximum score of 36 and a service/facility score of 271, accounting for about one third of the Boroughs convenience provision.

Four localities failed to achieve a maximum score, problems occurred with a lack of financial service provision (unsurprising given the contraction in the branch networks of the major banks / building societies), lack of café and gambling facilities.

A total of 13 community services / facilities are assessed for each locality, so the maximum score is 26, two localities attained this, Abbey & Wembrook and Bede & Poplar. The spread of scores ranged from 26 to 21 reflecting a good community service provision within each locality. Compared to other categories of service, such as, Convenience Services, the numbers of facilities are more modest ranging from 51 in Abbey & Wembrook to 30 for the localities of Weddington / St. Nicholas and Whitestone / Bulkington.

Where localities saw a drop in scores it was mainly due to the lack of just a few service / facilities, these are:

- Police Station / Office
- Youth Club
- Village / Community Hall
- Library
- Mobile Library

Four out of the seven neighbourhoods lack a permanent police presence, these localities being:

- Arbury & Stockingford
- Bedworth North & West
- Camp Hill & Galley Common
- Whitestone & Bulkington

In each case the neighbourhood score was zero, meaning that not only was the facility not within the locality but also the nearest police station / office were outside the distance threshold for that service, being between 1 km and 1.8 km from the locality boundary. This lack of facilities is perhaps not surprising given the budgetary constraints faced by the police service.

There is one other service / facility where it is not located within the locality & is located beyond what is considered a reasonable distance , this is the lack of a village hall / community centre at Weddington & St.Nicholas, the nearest being over 800 metres away in Abbey & Wembrook.

In the case of Youth facilities, Library and Mobile Library services these are not available “in locality” at Bedworth North and West, Weddington / St. Nicholas and Whitestone and Bulkington, but are located in a nearby locality within a reasonable distance.

Healthcare

Access to basic health care facilities can be used as a measure of sustainability. The provision of health care should be within a distance that people can easily travel to and via a range of transport options. In relation to this assessment the categories include:

- GP surgery/doctors health centre;
- Hospital;
- Dentist;
- Opticians.

The table below presents the healthcare scores for the localities.

In all 4 services / facilities are assessed in this category, the maximum score for a locality is thus 8, only one has all health services within the locality, this is Abbey & Wembrook.

The number of services / facilities provided is highly skewed with Abbey & Wembrook having nearly half (45%) of all healthcare services. The remaining localities have quite low numbers of facilities even getting down to just three services/facilities per locality.

Scores are reduced if the service/ facility is not provided in the locality; if it's nearby within the established threshold distance then only one point is scored, if the nearest facility is not within a reasonable distance then a zero score results.

All except Abbey & Wembrook have dropped points , just scoring 1 point instead of 2, meaning that the facility is nearby in the next locality. In each of the health services no locality has a facility which has to be provided both outside the locality and at an unreasonable distance.

Arbury & Stockingford and Bedworth North & West lack three healthcare services, two localities lack two services, namely, Camp Hill & Galley Common and Whitestone & Bulkington. The remainder, Bede & Poplar and Weddington lack just a single service.

It is not unusual for smaller settlements to lack significant access to healthcare facilities. This is generally due to the size of the settlement not necessarily requiring a significant healthcare provider. Also where facilities are concentrated such as in Abbey & Wembrook the transport infrastructure & services are good, allowing access from localities which are further away. For example, George Eliot Hospital has good public transport and car linkages.

Education Provision

Access to education is another good measure of sustainability. However it is noted that with education in particular, children living in the area may not go to the local school, and therefore the results in this section should be treated with a level of caution. This said, the pupils home location compared to the school attended varies with educational stage (excluding nursery) children tend to go to a nearby primary school, whereas attendance at a college could entail a long commute even out of district.

The categories include:

- Public nursery;
- Private day nursery;
- Primary school;
- Secondary School;
- College or Further Education.

The table below presents the scores for the localities in relation to education.

In all four types of educational provision are assessed , hence the maximum score for each locality is eight, only two localities has the full spectrum of educational facilities from nursery to a College or Further Education establishment ,these are Abbey & Wembrook and Bedworth North & West.

The range of scores is quite narrow from 6 to 8, points being dropped when high schools and colleges are not located within the locality.

The number of services/facilities ranges from 19 in Abbey & Wembrook to just 6 educational establishments in Camp Hill & Galley Common, which is very much, the exception. For five localities, the numbers of services/facilities are very similar ranging between 12 to 16.

For all localities, nursery and primary schools are provided within the locality.

All the localities have access to education facilities/services even if they are not directly within their own settlement boundary. All the settlements are able to demonstrate a school bus service, which allows access to nearby facilities in neighbouring settlements. This ensures that each locality has sufficient provision of educational facilities.

Location of employment opportunities and services

This section looks at the provision of employment opportunities and access to defined shopping areas. For the purposes of this assessment the categories include:

- Town Centre;
- Defined District Centre;
- Primarily Employment Area;

The table below presents the scores for the localities in relation to employment and defined shopping areas.

Three types of employment locations are assessed under this category; therefore, the maximum score to which each locality can attain is six and only one does, which is Abbey & Wembrook, which has a designated town centre, district centres plus numerous employment areas.

The Scores range from six to three. The locality with the poorest local employment opportunities is Bedworth & North & West, which has Bedworth town centre just beyond the locality boundary and two employment areas within.

The total provisions of services is dominated by Abbey & Wembrook (18 services/facilities) and Bede & Poplar in Bedworth (11 services / facilities), that is just over half (56%) of the Boroughs Employment and Service facilities.

Four localities lack a designated town centre, but having one nearby but the number of employment and service opportunities are more limited down to 8 & 7 in Weddington & Bulkington and Arbury & Stockingford respectively.

The remaining three localities Bedworth North & West, Camp Hill & Galley Common and Whitestone & Bulkington have only 2/3 facilities apiece.

CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The table below presents the total scores for all Localities after their assessment against each of the sustainability scoring criteria. It also identifies the total number of services and facilities available within the boundary of each locality.

Abbey & Wem Brook and Bede & Poplar sit at the top of the locality hierarchy due to the two town centres being located in these localities.

Whitestone & Bulkington, Arbury & Stockingford and Weddington & St Nicolas are situated in the middle of the hierarchy. It is considered that this position is due to their proximity to Abbey & Wem Brook and Bede & Poplar as well as the presence of District Centres in these localities.

Camp Hill & Galley Common and Bedworth North & West are at the bottom of the hierarchy probably as a result of them being the Borough's two most deprived localities.

Overall the total scores reflect the level of service provision within each locality. Abbey & Wembrook and Whitestone & Bulkington are considered to be the most sustainable of all localities in the Borough, whereas, Bedworth North & West / Camp Hill & Galley Common the least sustainable.

The audit of services and facilities and the analysis of contextual data have

demonstrated the respective sustainability of the localities within the Borough. This information has been used to draw up a locality hierarchy which should be considered as a suitable approach for the Borough Plan Development Plan


Establishing a Locality Hierarchy

The assessment of sustainability demonstrates that Abbey & Wem Brook and Bede & Poplar offer the highest range of services and facilities, many of which are accessed by the residents of the Borough.

It should be noted that this study has not looked at the capacity of all the localities to expand, nor has it identified whether services/facilities are at capacity. Therefore, if growth is to be considered in either of the localities further work should be carried out.

The diagram below sets out the recommended locality hierarchy for the Borough.
